1 General safety information

Keep this user information in a safe place so that you can refer to it at any time.

If you pass on the appliance, pass this user information on to subsequent owners.

To use the appliance properly and safely, read this user information carefully before installation and use. Always follow the instructions, safety instructions and warnings contained therein. They are important so that you can install and operate the appliance safely and properly.

1.1 Intended use

- Commercial use of these refrigerators and freezers includes, for example, their use in restaurants, canteens, hospitals and commercial establishments such as bakeries, butchers, supermarkets, etc.

1.2 Foreseeable erroneous use

The following applications are expressly prohibited:

- Storage and cooling of:
 - Chemically unstable, flammable or corrosive substances
 - Explosive substances, such as aerosol containers with flammable propellant gas
 - Medication, blood plasma, laboratory compounds or similar substances and products subject to the Medical Device Directive 2007/47/EC
 - Use outdoors or in damp and splash water areas
- Use in explosive areas

Improper use of the appliance will result in damage or spoilage of the stored goods.

1.3 User group

- This appliance must not be used by persons (including children) with reduced physical, sensory or mental capabilities, or by persons with a lack of experience and knowledge, unless they are supervised by a person responsible for their safety or have been given instructions on how to use the appliance. Children must be supervised to ensure that they do not play with the appliance.

1.4 Warning notices – Risks for the user

- **WARNING:** Do not close the ventilation openings in the appliance housing or in the installation housing.
- **WARNING:** Do not use any mechanical devices or other means to speed up the defrosting process other than those recommended by the manufacturer.

- **WARNING:** Do not damage the coolant circuit.
- **WARNING:** Do not operate electrical appliances inside the refrigerator/freezer compartment that are not of the type recommended by the manufacturer.

Once the appliance has been installed, it must still be possible to disconnect it from the mains.

- Accessible mains plug (above, below or next to the appliance)
- Tripping of the fuse in the building's electrical installation in accordance with the installation regulations.



WARNING: Fire hazard/flammable substances.

The symbol is located on the compressor and may also appear in other places on the appliance. It marks the danger posed by flammable substances. Do not remove the sticker.

- The more refrigerant there is in the appliance, the larger than room must be in which it is located. In rooms that are too small, a leak can produce a flammable gas/air mixture. For every 8 g of refrigerant, the installation room must be at least 1 m³ in size. Information on the refrigerant contained is given on the type plate inside the appliance.
- Clean regularly surfaces that can come in contact with food and accessible drainage systems.
- If the fridge-freezer is left empty for a long period, switch it off, defrost it, clean it, dry it and leave the door open to prevent mould from forming.
- **WARNING:** Before carrying out any cleaning, maintenance or repair work on the appliance, it must be completely disconnected from the mains supply.
- **WARNING:** At least two people are required for transport, assembly, disassembly, testing, use or scrapping to ensure stability. For large or heavy appliances, at least four people must be involved. This will help prevent you from losing your balance, falling or making uncontrolled movements.
- Install appliances with a gap of 30 mm between the appliances. (see 3.11 Installing multiple appliances)
- Avoid prolonged skin contact with cold surfaces or with cold food. Use gloves for protection, for example.
- Alcoholic beverages and other containers bearing alcohol must be sealed tight for storage. Any leaking alcohol may ignite due to electrical parts.
- Only open the door for a short time. This prevents the temperature inside the appliance from rising.
- Do not reach between the door and the appliance when opening and closing. Fingers may become trapped.
- Do not pull out drawers without a stop mechanism all the way, to prevent the drawer and its contents from falling out.
- **WARNING:** This appliance must be secured in accordance with the instruction manual to prevent any risks arising from a lack of stability.
- Follow the instructions for installation and connection. (see 3 Setting up and connecting)

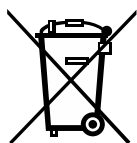
1.5 Faults, damage and repairs

- Mains connection with cooling appliance plug:
If the mains lead of this appliance is damaged, it must be replaced with a special connection line available from the manufacturer or its customer service department. The customer may make the change.

General safety information

- Repairs and interventions on the appliance may only be carried out by the customer service or by other qualified personnel trained for this purpose.
- In the event of malfunctions and appliance faults, pull out the mains plug or switch off the fuse. Always hold the plug when pulling out the mains plug. Never tug on the cable.

1.6 Information concerning disposal



The crossed-out rubbish bin symbol is a note that the appliance must not be disposed of with unsorted household waste and must be placed in a separate collection. It contains recyclable materials and may be reusable.



The symbol may be found on the compressor. It pertains to the oil in the compressor and indicates the following danger: **Can be fatal if swallowed or with penetration of the respiratory tract.** This information is only significant for recycling. No risk exists with normal use.



This or a similar sticker may be on the rear of the appliance. It indicates that there are vacuum insulation panels (VIP) or perlite panels in the door and/or housing. This information is only significant for recycling. Do not remove the sticker.

- The old appliance must be properly and therefore professionally disposed of in accordance with the local applicable regulations and legislation. When transporting the old appliance do not damage the refrigerant circuit, so that the refrigerant inside (information on the type plate) and the oil do not leak out uncontrolled.
- Please note that it is the customer's responsibility to delete any personal data that may be held.*
- For Germany: The appliance can be disposed of free of charge via the class 1 collection containers at the local recycling/reusable material centres. When purchasing a new refrigerator/freezer and a sales area > 400 m², the old appliance is also taken back free of charge via the trade.
- EU: Please check with your local authorities to find out how to dispose of old appliances.
- Where lamps can be removed easily and without causing damage, they must also be removed before disposal and disposed of via the relevant collection schemes.

1.7 Sound emission of the appliance

- The A-weighted emission sound pressure level during operation of the appliance is below 70 dB(A) (sound power rel. 1 pW).

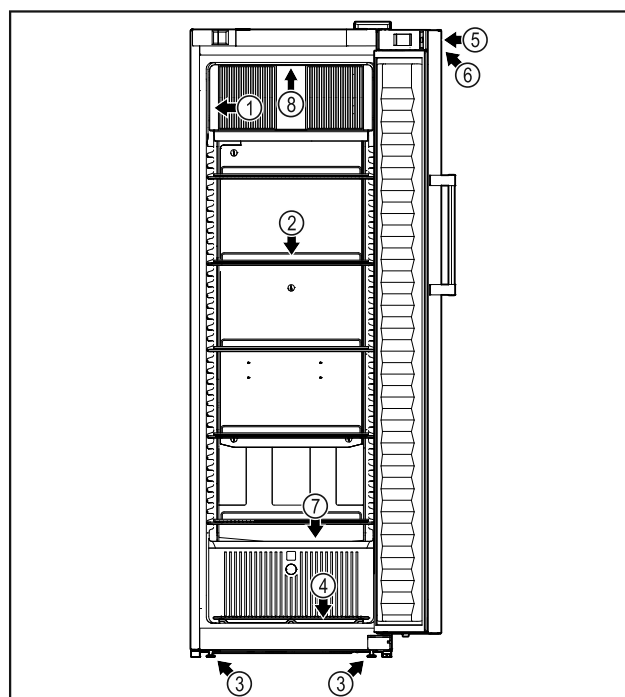


Fig. 2 Example illustration

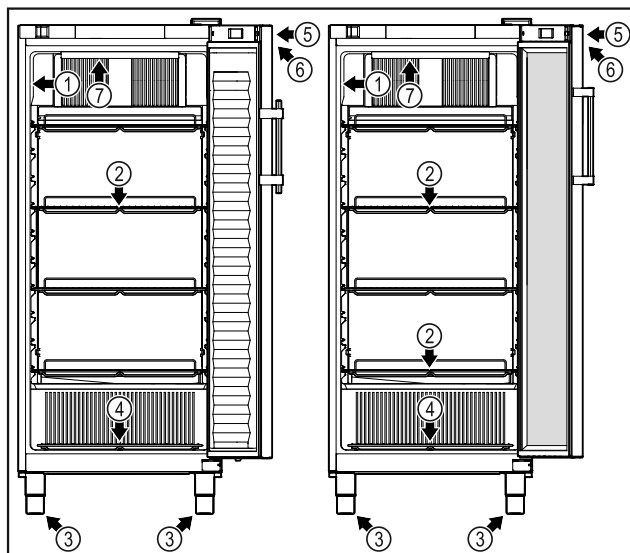


Fig. 3 Example illustration

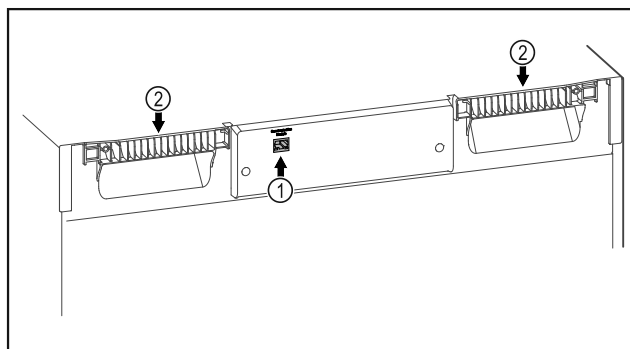


Fig. 4 Example illustration

3 Setting up and connecting

3.1 Installation requirements

The installation conditions are crucial to ensure that you can operate your appliance safely, efficiently and without problems.

- Observe all safety instructions.
- Consider the location and position in the room.



WARNING

Danger of fire due to incorrect positioning!

If the mains cable or plug touches the back of the appliance, the vibration can damage the mains cable or the plug resulting in a short circuit.

- Make sure the mains cable is not trapped under the appliance when you position the appliance.
- Stand the appliance so that it is not touched by connectors or main cables.
- Do not connect any appliances to sockets in the area of the back of the appliance.
- Do **not** place and operate multi-sockets/power distributors and other electronic devices (such as halogen transformers) at the back of the appliances.



WARNING

Fire hazard due to dampness!

If live parts or the mains lead become damp this may cause short circuits.

- The appliance is designed for use in enclosed areas. Do not operate the appliance outdoors or in areas where it is exposed to splash water or damp conditions.



WARNING

Risk of fire due to leaking refrigerant and oil!

The refrigerant inside the appliance is environmentally friendly, but flammable. The oil it contains is also flammable. Escaping refrigerant and oil can ignite in high concentrations and in contact with an external heat source.

- Do not damage the refrigerant circuit pipes or the compressor.

3.1.1 Installation site

- A dry and well-ventilated room is an optimum installation location.
- If the appliance is installed in a very damp environment, condensation may form on the appliance exterior. Always make sure there is good ventilation and aeration at the installation site.
- The more refrigerant there is in the appliance, the larger the room must be in which it is located. In rooms that are too small, a leak can produce a flammable gas/air mixture. For every 8 g of refrigerant, the installation room must be at least 1 m³ in size. Information on the refrigerant contained is given on the type plate inside the appliance.
- The floor on which the appliance stands must be horizontal and level.
- The site of use must be able to bear the weight of the device including the maximum load. (see 10.1 Technical specifications)

3.1.2 Position in space

- Do not place the appliance in direct sunlight or near radiators or similar sources of heat.

- Always position the appliance with the rear directly on the wall.
- Use in hazardous areas is not permitted.

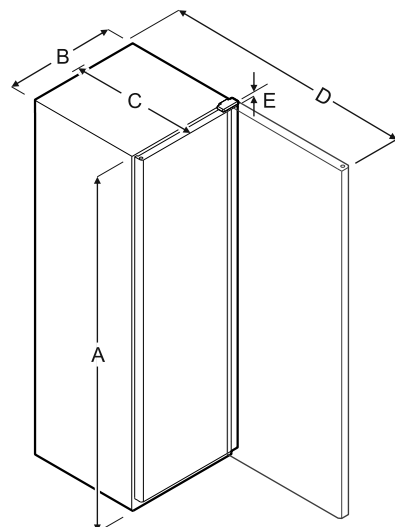

3.3 Transporting the appliance



WARNING

Risk of injury due to broken glass!*

When transporting at an altitude of more than 1500 m, the glass panes of the door may break. This can result in sharp-edged fragments, which can cause serious injuries.

- Take appropriate protective action.



WARNING

Risk of injury and damage due to the appliance tipping over!

- Pay attention to uneven floors and ramps when transporting appliances.

3.3.1 Transporting the appliance for initial use

Ensure that the following requirements are met:

- ☐ The appliance is packaged.
- ☐ The appliance is upright.
- Transport the appliance with the help of two people.
- Unpacking the appliance. (see 3.4 Unpacking the appliance)

3.3.2 Transporting the appliance after initial use

Observe the following instructions if you wish to transport or move the appliance again after initial use.

Ensure that the following requirements are met:

- ☐ The appliance is emptied.
- ☐ The appliance is upright.
- ☐ Appliance with door(s): Door is secured against accidental opening.
- ☐ Appliance with telescopic unit: The telescopic unit is secured against accidental opening.
- ☐ Appliance with adjustable feet: Adjustable feet are screwed in.

If you want to transport the appliance over a short distance:*

- Move the appliance using the rollers on the ground.*

If you want to transport the appliance over a greater distance:*

- Transport the appliance with the help of two people.

After transport:

- Unscrew the adjustable feet on the appliance.*
- Align the appliance.

3.4 Unpacking the appliance

- Check the appliance and packaging: If you suspect that the goods have been damaged in transit, please contact the supplier before connecting them.

NOTICE

Damage to property caused by pointed or sharp objects! Using pointed or sharp objects when removing packaging material may damage the appliance.

- Do not use any pointed or sharp objects to remove the packaging material.

- Remove the packaging materials.
- The appliance is positioned correctly: Remove the protective film from the door and side panels.

3.5 Removing the transport lock

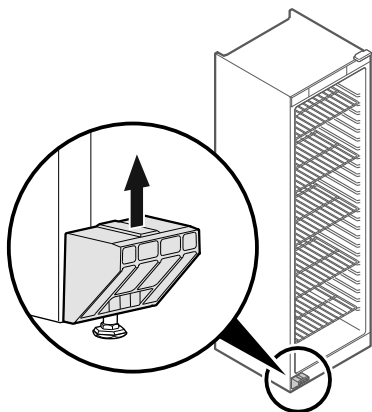

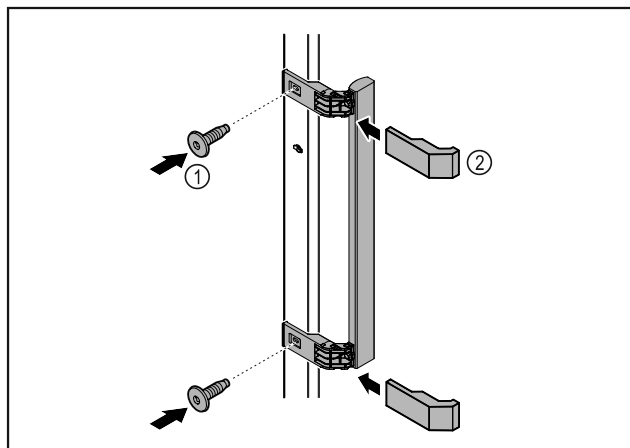

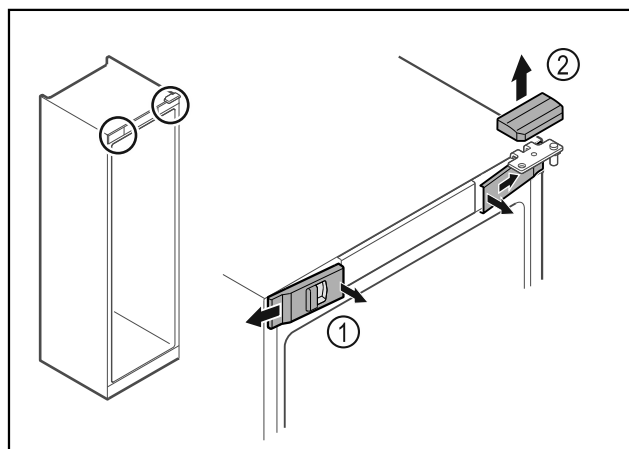

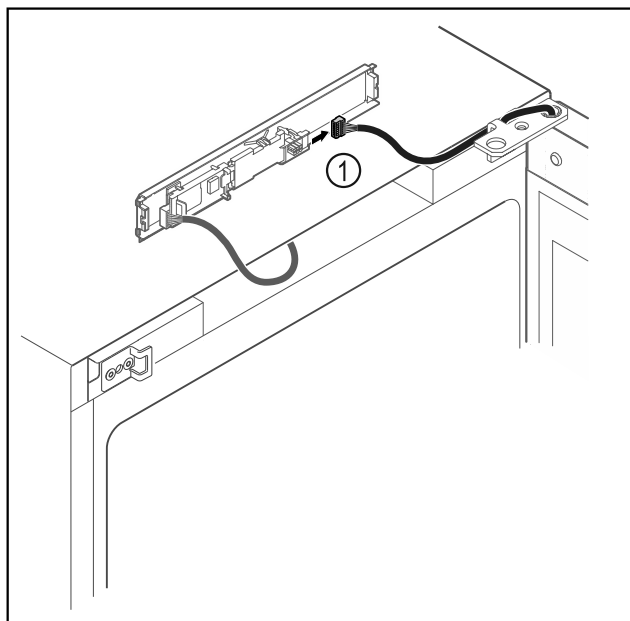

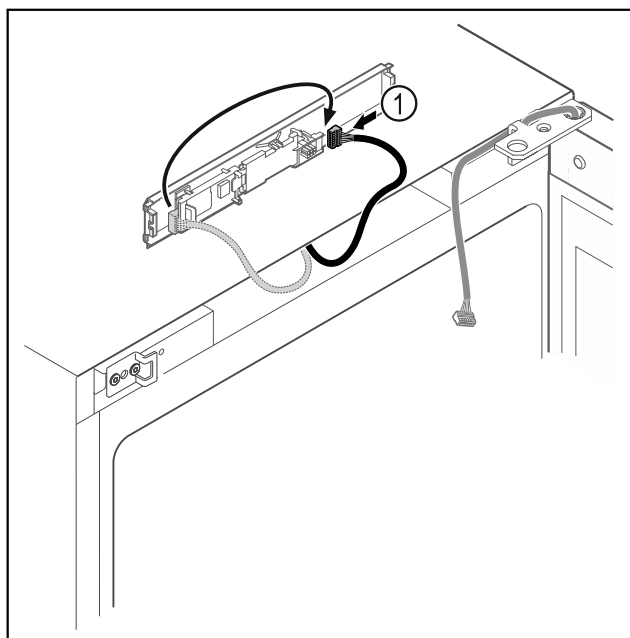

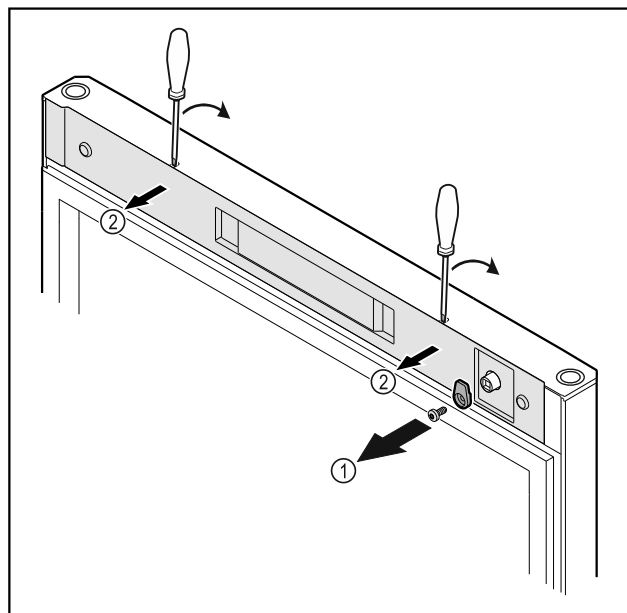

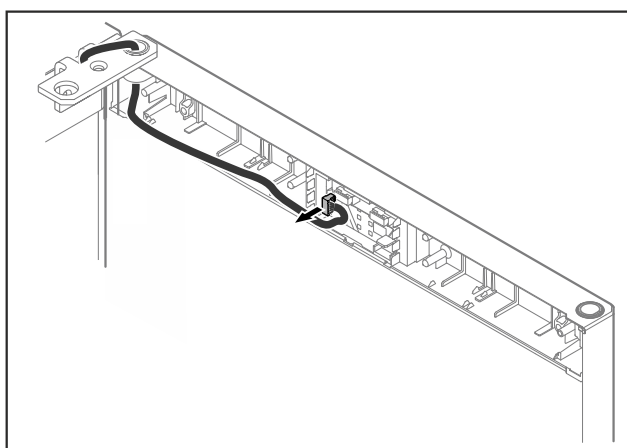

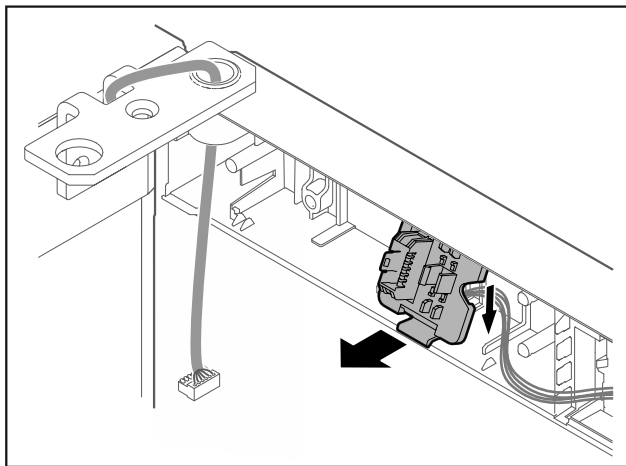


Fig. 15 The installation position for the plug holder can be rotated by 180°.*

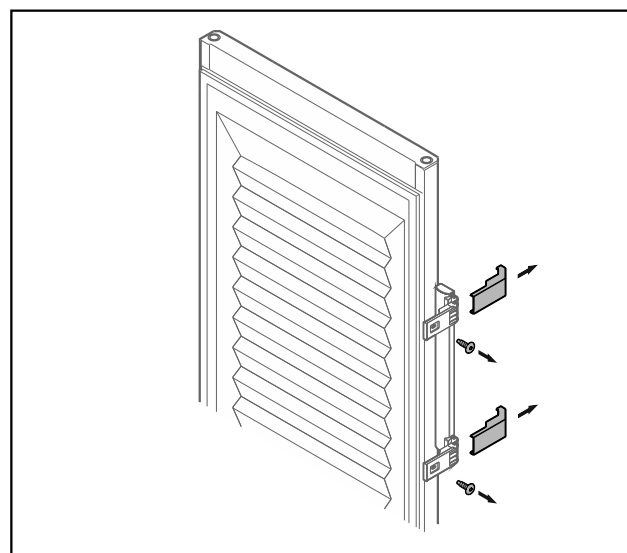
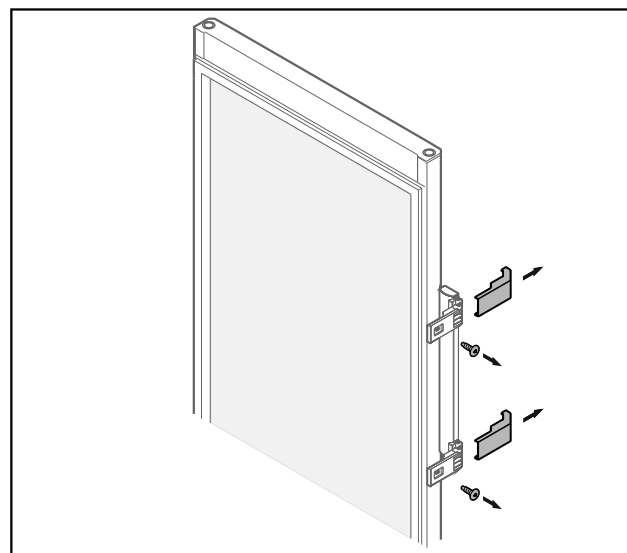


Fig. 24 Insulated door*

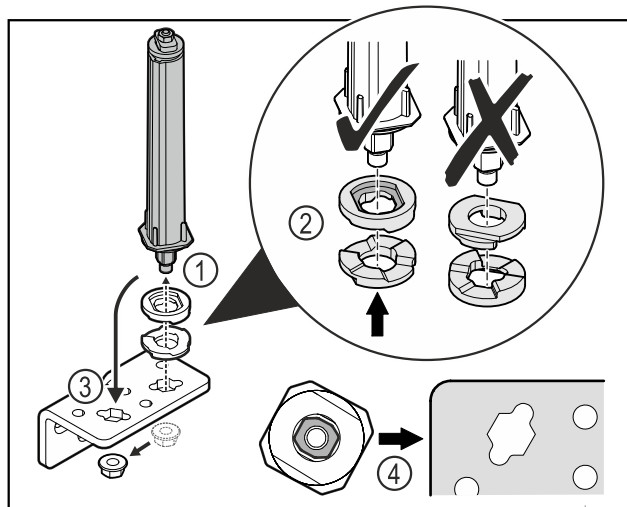

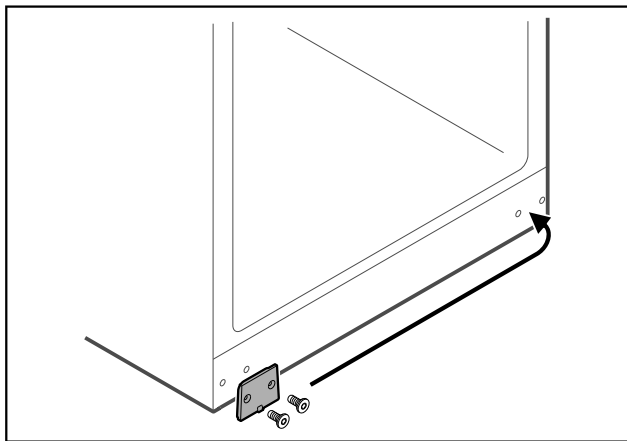

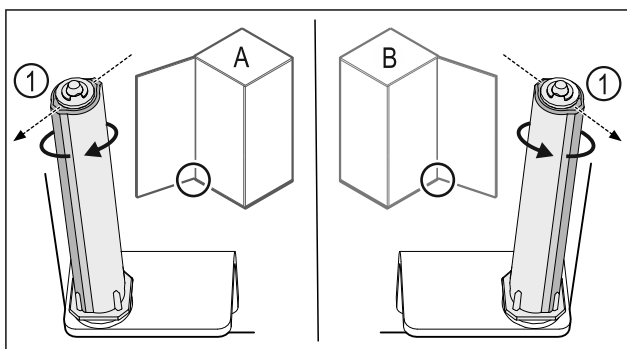


Fig. 37 Left-hinged (A) / Right-hinged (B)

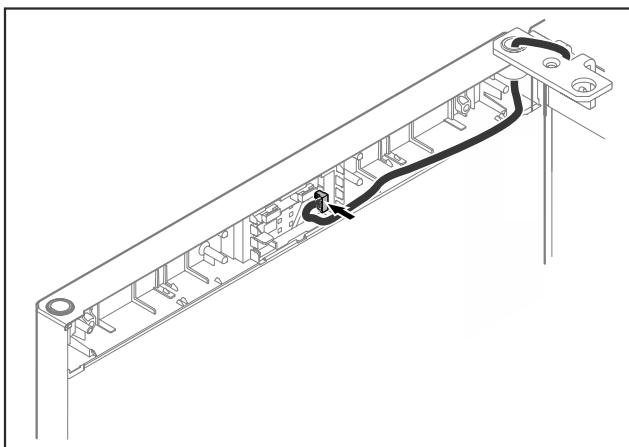

If the door is not straight, you can adjust it on the lower hinge.

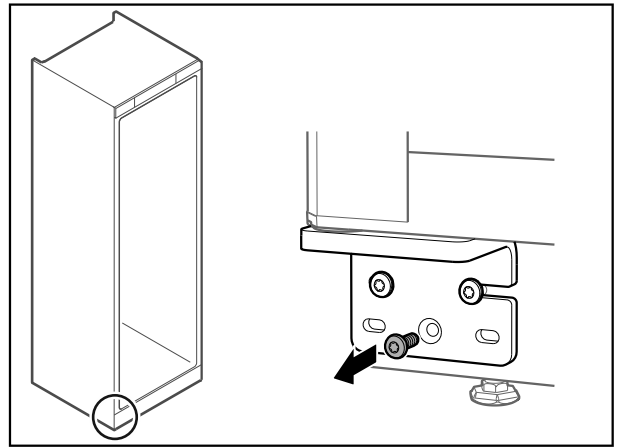

- Remove the middle screw on the lower hinge.

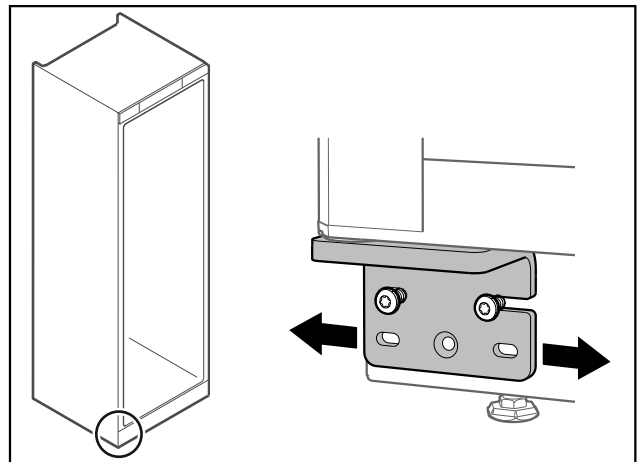

CAUTION

The door can knock against the wall and become damaged as a result. In the case of glass doors, the damaged glass can cause injuries.

- Protect the door from knocking against the wall. Attach door stopper, e.g. felt stopper, to the wall.

- Connect all necessary components (e.g. mains cable) to the back of the appliance and route to the side.

Note

Cables can be damaged.

- Do not jam the cable when pushing the appliance back.

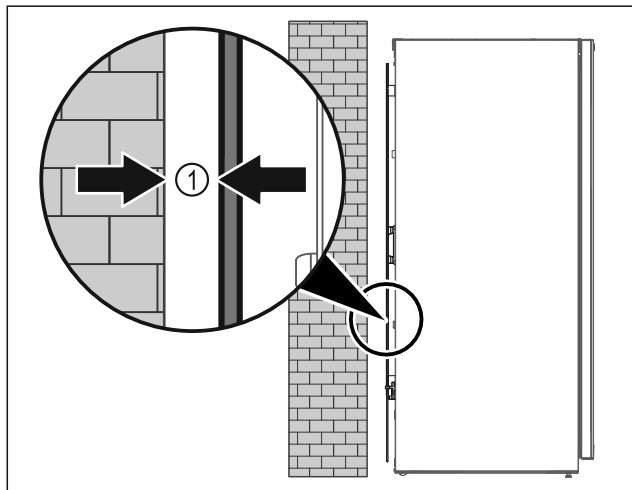

3.10 Setting up the appliance so it is level

NOTICE

Appliance body is deformed and door does not close.

- Align appliance horizontally and vertically.
- Compensate for uneven floors using adjustable feet.



WARNING

Incorrect height adjustment of the adjustable foot! Can cause severe or even fatal injury. Incorrect height adjustment can cause the bottom part of the adjustable foot to come loose and the appliance to tip over.

- Do not unscrew the adjustable foot too far.

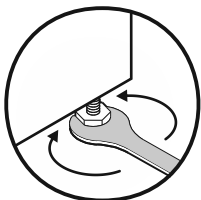

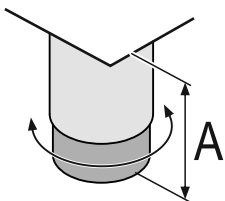


Fig. 54 The adjustable foot can be adjusted from A = 150 mm (6 5/16 in) to 180 mm (7 1/16 in).*

3.11 Installing multiple appliances

NOTICE

Risk of damage due to condensation between the side walls.

- Do not install the appliance directly next to another fridge.
- Install appliances with a space 3 cm between appliances.

- At higher levels of humidity, increase space between appliances.

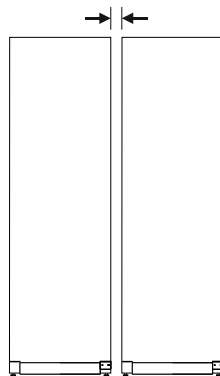


Fig. 55 Side-by-side installation

3.12 After setting up

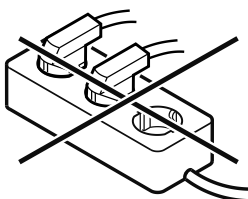

4 Functionality of the Touch display

You operate your appliance using the Touch display. You select appliance functions in the Touch display (hereafter referred to as display) by tapping them. If you do not perform any action on the display for 10 seconds, the display either jumps back to the higher-level menu or directly to the status display.

4.1 Navigation and symbol explanation

In the illustrations, different symbols are used to navigate the display. The following table describes these symbols.

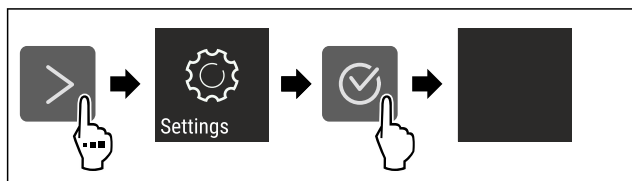


Fig. 56 Example illustration

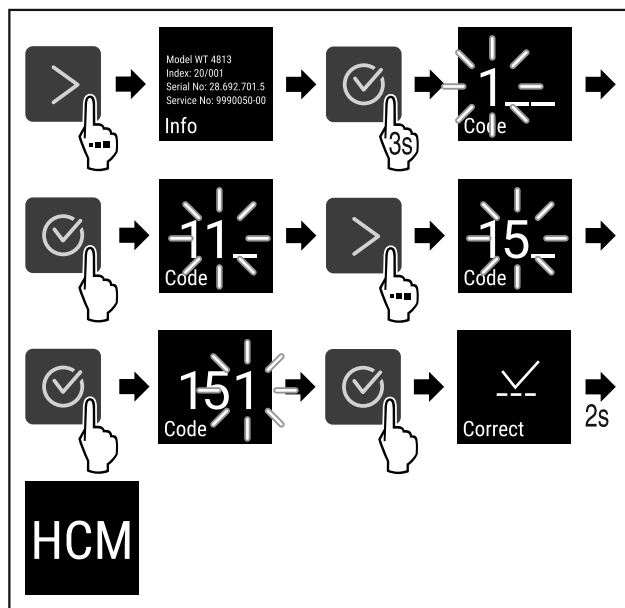


Fig. 57 Access with numerical code **151**

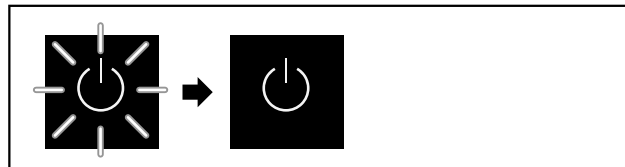


Fig. 58 Example illustration

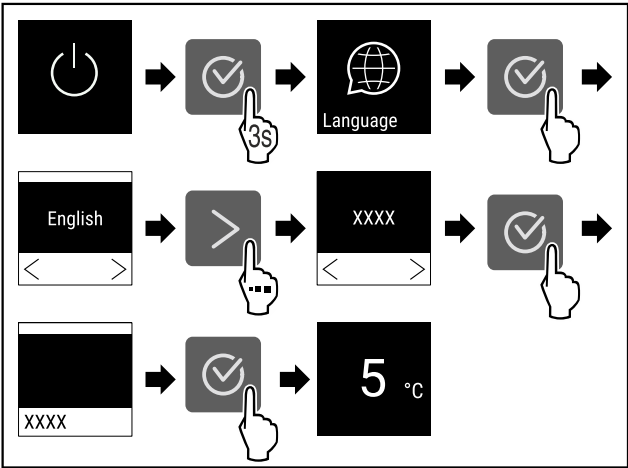

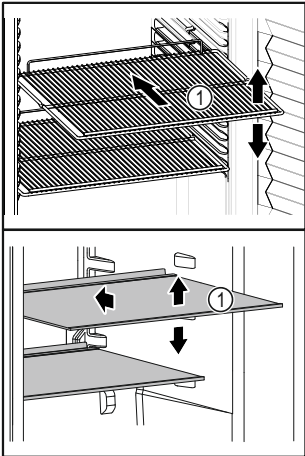


Fig. 60 Example illustration

 - ❑ Ventilation slots *Fig. 61 (2)* for recirculation fan in the interior must be kept clear.
 - ❑ Refrigerated goods must not touch the rear wall.
 - ❑ Refrigerated items do not protrude beyond the shelves.
 - ❑ Keep liquids in closed containers.
 - ❑ Package raw meat or fish in clean, closed containers. This will prevent meat or fish from touching or dripping onto other food.
 - ❑ Leave space when storing items for refrigeration to ensure good air circulation.

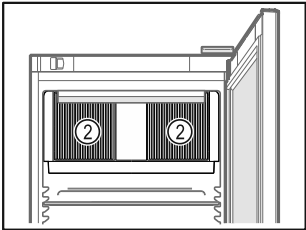

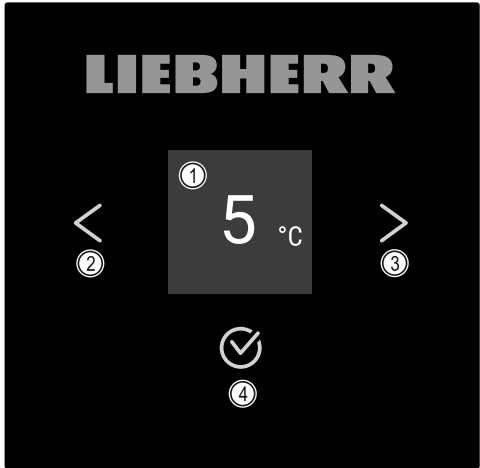


Fig. 62 Display

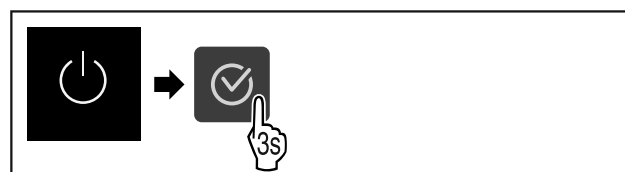

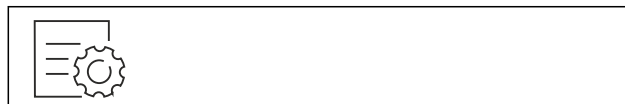

7.2.3 Temperature

The temperature depends on the following factors:

- How often the door is opened
- How long the door is open for
- The room temperature of the installation site
- The type, temperature and amount of refrigerated items

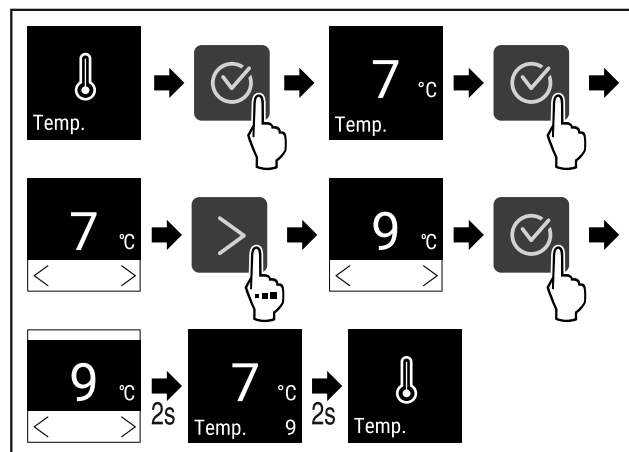


Fig. 70 Changing temperature from 7 °C to 9 °C

7.2.4 Temperature recording

The appliance displays the minimum and maximum temperatures of the interior. 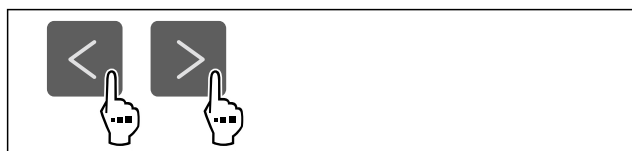

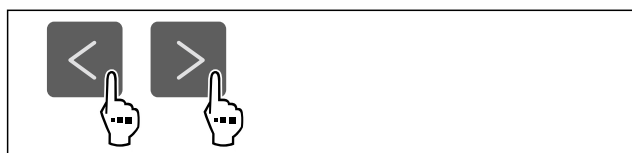

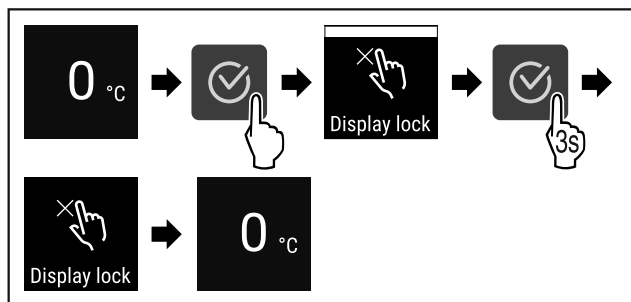

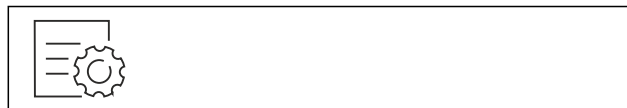

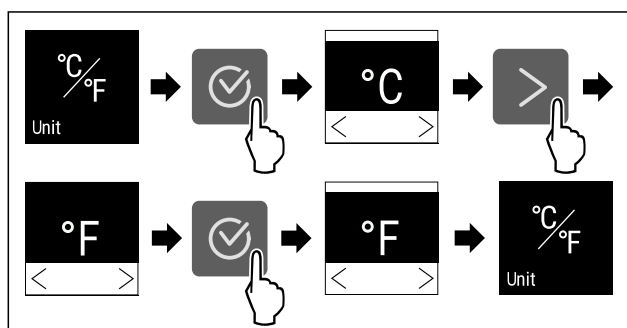


Fig. 101 Example illustration: Switch from degrees Celsius to degrees Fahrenheit.

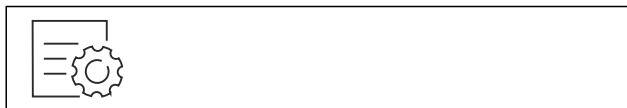

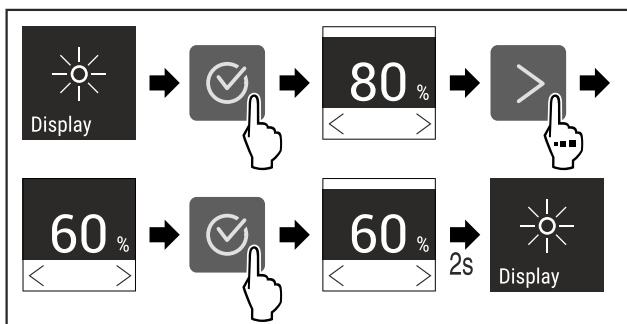


Fig. 103 Example illustration: Switch from 80 % to 60 %.

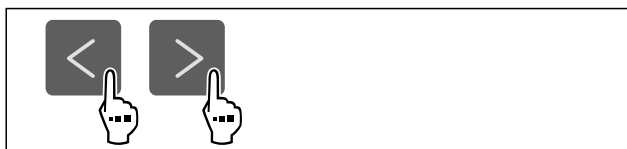

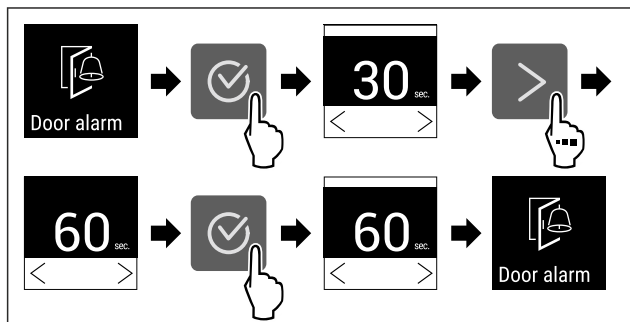


Fig. 131 Example illustration: Switch door alarm from 30 seconds to 60 seconds.

7.3.2 Reminder

8.1 Safety lock

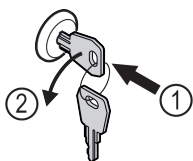


Fig. 144 Example illustration

8.1.2 Unlocking appliance

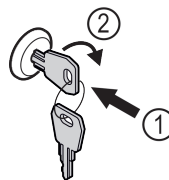


Fig. 145 Example illustration

9 Maintenance

9.1 Defrosting appliance



WARNING

Improper defrosting of the appliance!
Injuries and damage.

- ▶ Do not use mechanical equipment or other methods to speed up the defrosting process other than those recommended by the manufacturer.
- ▶ Do not use electrical heating or steam-cleaning appliances, naked flames or defroster sprays to defrost.
- ▶ Do not use sharp objects to remove ice.

Defrosting is performed automatically. The defrost water drains through the opening and evaporates.

To maintain the functionality of the appliance, we recommend defrosting it when there is a high buildup of ice. Icing in the interior is determined by the location (e.g. high humidity), settings on the appliance and incorrect user behaviour.

If the automatic defrosting cycle is insufficient: *

- ▶ Start automatic defrosting manually.
(see 7.2.19 Defrosting *) *

If the problem persists, defrost the appliance manually:*

If automatic defrosting is insufficient, defrost the appliance manually:*

- ▶ Switch off appliance. (see 7.2.2 Switching appliance on and off)
- ▶ Pull out mains plug.
- ▶ Store refrigerated items elsewhere.
- ▶ Leave appliance door open during defrosting process.
- ▶ Soak up remaining defrost water with a cloth, clean drain opening and the appliance.

9.2 Cleaning the appliance

9.2.1 Preparing

9.2.2 Cleaning housing

9.2.3 Cleaning fan cover

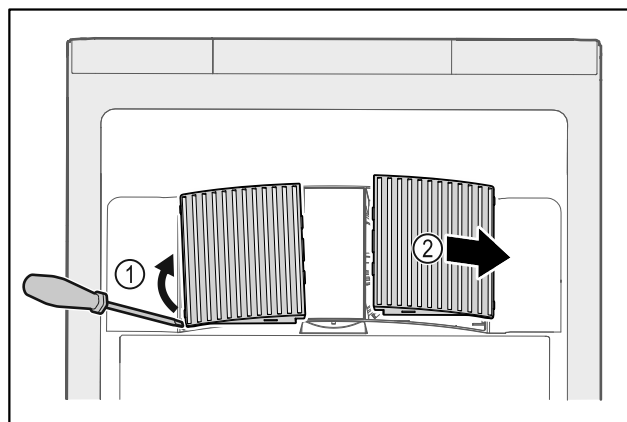

- ▶ Carefully lever out fan covers from the side Fig. 146 (1) and remove towards the front Fig. 146 (2).
- ▶ Rinse the air slots of the fan covers under running water. If very dirty, use lukewarm water with a neutral cleaner.
- ▶ Leave fan covers to air-dry completely.
- ▶ Reattach fan covers to the appliance.

9.2.4 Cleaning interior

- ▶ Clean interior and equipment parts with lukewarm water and a little detergent. Do not use any gritty or acidic cleaning agent or any chemical solvent.

9.2.5 After cleaning

- ▶ Wipe appliance and equipment parts dry.
- ▶ Connect and switch on appliance.
Once the temperature is sufficiently cold:
- ▶ put in items for refrigeration goods.
- ▶ Repeat cleaning regularly.
- ▶ Clean and remove dust from the refrigeration unit with heat exchanger once a year.

10.2 Technical fault

Your appliance is designed and built to ensure it works reliably and has a long service life. In the unlikely event that a fault occurs during operation, please check whether the fault is due to an operating error. If this is the case, you will be charged for the cost incurred even if this falls within the warranty period.

You can fix the following faults yourself.

10.2.1 Appliance function

Defect	Cause	Remedy
	→ The IEC socket is not plugged into the appliance correctly.	► Check the IEC socket.
Temperature is not cold enough.	→ The appliance door is not closed properly.	► Close appliance door.
	→ Ventilation is not sufficient.	► Clear ventilation grille and clean it.
	→ The ambient temperature is too high.	► Ensure the correct ambient conditions:
	→ The appliance was opened too many times or for too long.	► Wait to see if the appliance goes back to the required temperature by itself. If not, contact Customer Service. (see 10.3 Customer Service)
	→ The temperature is set incorrectly.	► Set a colder temperature and check after 24 hours.
	→ The appliance is too close to a heat source (oven, radiator, etc).	► Change where the appliance or the heat source are located.

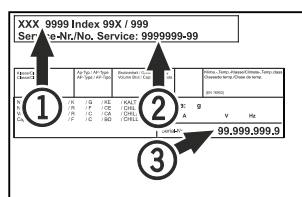

11 Shutting down

- Empty the appliance.
- Switch off the appliance.
- Pull the mains plug out of the socket.
- Remove the IEC socket if required: Pull the IEC socket out of the appliance plug and move it to the left and right at the same time.
- Clean appliance (see 9.2 Cleaning the appliance).
- If present: Remove the covers and insulation from the sensor feed-through to prevent mould forming.
- Leave the door open so that no bad odours form.

Note

- Damage to the appliance and malfunctions!
- After shutting down, only store the appliance at the permitted room temperature of between -10 °C and +50 °C.

12 Disposal

12.1 Preparing appliance for disposal



Liebherr uses batteries in some of its appliances. In the EU, for environmental reasons, legislation obliges the end user to remove these batteries before disposing of old appliances. If your appliance contains batteries, a corresponding notice is attached.

Lamps

If you can remove the lamps yourself without destroying them, also remove these before disposal.

- Take the appliance out of operation.
- If possible: remove lamps without destroying them.

Additional information

12.2 Disposing of the appliance in an environmentally friendly manner



The appliance still contains valuable materials and must be disposed of separately from unsorted municipal waste.



Dispose of batteries separately from the old appliance. To do this, you can return the batteries free of charge to retailers as well as recycling centres and collection centres for recyclable materials.

Lamps

Dispose of removed lamps via the respective collection systems.

For Germany:

You can dispose of the appliance free of charge via the class 1 collection containers at the local recycling and recyclable material collection centres. When purchasing a new fridge/freezer, if the sales area > 400 m², retailers will also take back the old appliance free of charge.
